#### Schueller's VW "bug" a labor of love


The classic sound of a first generation Volkswagen Beetle is long-gone in Emily Scheuller's "bug" after converting the car to an electric motor this summer. Emily, a 4.0 GPA student and National Merit Scholar semifinalist, is interested in environmental issues and green technology.

She began talking to her father Albert about the possibilities of creating an electric car. They found a 1965 VW bug in Tri-Cities in June and began the project shortly afterwards. They purchased an electric motor conversion kit online. Albert did a lot of the heavy lifting, but Emily says she helped weld, purchase parts and read electrical diagrams. They finished the project in late August and the car can now be seen, but not heard, driving around Walla Walla.

Emily says the car's top speed is 35 mph and it's capable of traveling 12 miles per charge. She hopes to paint the car and put a new stereo in it. She says spending time with her dad was the most rewarding aspect of the project.

### Replacement levy helps fuel local economy

I love autumn! The weather is turning a bit cooler, leaves are about to turn color, football season is upon us and school has started. It is the final item that excites me the most. For 45 of my 50 years of life, I have been privileged to return to school in the fall. As I begin my 29<sup>th</sup> year in education, I am as excited as I have ever been about a school year due to the incredible support our children and District receive from our community. On their behalf, thank you!

Our year has gotten off to a terrific start. Enrollment is strong; we have nearly 6150 students enrolled in our district, equating to over 5995 full-time equivalent students. Enrollment growth continues to be steady in Walla Public Schools, which is significant in these economic times, as our primary funding source is state apportionment based on a set dollar amount per student.

However, another important funding source is our Replacement Levy. This levy is paid by local taxpayers based upon property value and it represents almost 20 percent of our funding. In February, voters will be asked to replace the levy which was approved in 2008. I look forward to having the opportunity to inform our patrons of the uses of these tax dollars and how the district contributes to the local economy, as well as how we are educating our community's children.

Many thanks to the Safe Travels Alliance, Walla Walla Police and Sheriff's Departments for all their work in helping raise awareness around school zones. With so many children walking to and from school, we need everyone to be extra diligent and keep our kids safe.

It is such a privilege to have the opportunity to serve as superintendent of Walla Walla Public Schools. We have so many wonderful kids, staff members and programs. The district is also a vital part of the local economy. Please check our website regularly to see some of what is going on in our schools. Also, I would love to hear from you. #### Homelink partners with YMCA

In order to foster deeper collaboration between agencies and provide additional enrichment opportunities for students, Homelink has entered into a partnership with the Walla Walla YMCA.

The program is in the infancy stages, thus enrichment offerings will be made available based on student, staff, and parent input along with the Y's ability to support those offerings. Currently the program operates on a two-day model with students in grades 1-4 participating on Mondays and Wednesdays and kindergarten and grades 5-8 on Tuesdays and Thursdays. At the YMCA, students have the opportunity to experience rock climbing, archery, technology, team sports, creative movement, and art. Homelink students also participate in science, math, language arts/communication/humanities, art, physical education, and other academics at their Berney School location

Homelink is a Parent Partnership Program with approximately 130 students in grades K-8. Students can either attend classes on campus two days per week for a maximum of nine hours or complete their educational hours entirely at home with weekly meetings.

- 10. Designate a law enforcement officer for gang work
- 11. Offer tattoo removal and relocation support
