

Science labs join list of needs at Wa-Hi

Any excess bond dollars will be returned to Walla Walla taxpayers

Walla Walla Public Schools will seek a \$48 million bond on the February 12, 2013 Special Election to fund a \$69.6 million modernization of Walla Walla High School.

All of the existing 1963 buildings will be remodeled and upgraded in the design to economize construction costs. The project is eligible for \$21.6 million in State Matching dollars which will all be used on the Wa-Hi project. Should there be any excess funds, they will be returned to taxpayers. The bond represents an increase of 68 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. The recently approved College Place School District bond was \$2.67 per \$1,000 of assessed

Welcome to 2013! I hope you had a wonderful holiday season and that your year is off to a great start.

The tragic events last month in Connecticut remind us of the importance of school security. We have a number of procedures in place to help keep schools safe. Students and staff have been through the required drills and we continue to refine our practices. However, we must have your help as well. Our relationships and diligence are two of our most effective methods of ensuring safe schools.

Enhanced security is one component of the upcoming Walla Walla High School bond election set for February 12. Currently, there are over 100 exterior doors at Wa-Hi and the remodeled school would reduce that number by over 80%. The bond would pay for a full modernization of the academic, math/science, library, music and commons buildings. Further, the CTE building would be refurbished. A kitchen, fitness center and music building will be built, along with the addition of an all-weather track. The entire campus will have new HVAC systems for energy efficiency and comfort. All portable classrooms will be removed from the campus. Wa-Hi has served us well for the past 49 years, but it is showing its age on the interior despite the excellent work of our custodial and maintenance staff.

Congratulations to the staff and students at Prospect Point Elementary School on being named a *School of Distinction* by the Center for Educational Effectiveness for the second consecutive year. Congratulations as well to the Wa-Hi girls' cross country team on earning a second consecutive Washington Interscholastic Activities Association Academic State Championship with a combined GPA of 3.979. Congratulations to coach Mike Locati and these outstanding student-athletes.

Finally, thank you to our Board ... President Anne Golden, Vice-President Dan Hess, Cindy Meyer, Max Carrera, and Ruth Ladderud for their contributions to the students and staff in Walla Walla.

Superintendent Miller forms committee to study Lincoln HS facility needs

Superintendent **Mick Miller** is forming a broad-based committee to study two main issues facing a Lincoln High School facilities improvement plan.

The first issue is to determine whether to remain at the current campus location or find a new home. If the determination is to remain at the 3rd Ave. location, then the committee will make a recommendation to build new or renovate the existing 1927 school. Miller will seek a third party expert to study the condition of the existing building.

Lincoln High School is the district's next priority following the Wa-Hi bond election. Miller plans to bring a recommendation from the committee to the school board in June.



One issue the group will study is whether to remodel the 1927 school or construct a new school.

Federal Farm-to-School Grant Program plows the way for more local produce in schools

Walla Walla Public Schools was awarded a \$96,000 United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Grant to increase the availability of local produce. The funding will also enhance educational opportunities for students, staff and the community about food and agriculture.

Longtime school garden advocate, parent volunteer and nutrition specialist **Beth Thiel** has been contracted to serve as the Farm-to-School grant coordinator for the school district.

"The goals of this grant will benefit students and the entire community by increasing the purchase of locally grown food for our school cafeterias," said Thiel. "It will also help us expand the

utilization of school gardens, better educate young students about food and farming and teach district staff and parents about cooking healthy meals."

This fall, Walla Walla students saw an increase in the amount and variety of fruits, vegetables and legumes served in school lunches: a requirement of the National School Lunch Program's Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act of 2010. Walla Walla students in grades K-12 are required to have at least one half cup of fruits or vegetables on their tray at every meal.

"This is a positive change for student health," said Thiel. "The Farm-to-School program aims to ensure students are eating those extra fruits and vegetables daily."

One strategy Thiel is introducing in Walla Walla is working with area farmers to bring in more locally grown produce. Thiel says this move and others will entice students to make healthier food choices.

"By providing the freshest, most flavorful local produce, we can influence student preference for healthy foods," said Thiel. "School gardens and cooking activities, as well as farm field trips and farmer visits to schools, also play critical roles."



We can't use the track for PE or track & field because it is unsafe. As head track coach, I see the difficulty and cost associated with busing 180 students to Martin Field every day for 12 weeks."
