"¡La Chispa! helps students build selfconfidence, strengthen their cultural identity and increase academic success," said Marilyn Melgoza, Latino Outreach Coordinator. "Last year we had the opportunity to sponsor 64 students, so we are excited to have more students join this year."

District leaders understand the importance of getting students involved in afterschool activities and specialized coursework. They have eliminated all sports fees, ASB costs and lab/course fees. This move is linked to Goal Four of the district's Strategic Plan which focuses on Student Engagement and Safe Schools.

"Students who get involved are more vested in their school and learning," said Superintendent Wade Smith. "We are finding ways to remove barriers and connect students to their schools."

This investment is already showing promise as more students are participating in sports and clubs. Last year competitive soccer was added at both middle schools and this year Slow Pitch Softball was added at Walla Walla High School.

The anticipated annual savings to parents is \$150,000 by the district eliminating middle school ASB card, class and lab fees. The district reallocated the necessary resources to enhance engagement.

Superintendent Smith says Walla Walla Public Schools is in rare company when it comes to the practice of eliminating fees. The district has also partnered with the United Way of Walla Walla through the Adopt-a-Blue Devil program to help fund equipment and other student

"I'm not aware of any other district in the state doing what we are doing," Smith said. "We are committed to student engagement."



Voters show strong support for Replacement Bond measure

The November 6 General Election was a historic night for Walla Walla Public Schools as voters approved a \$65.6 million Replacement Bond with a 72% yes vote. Local bond dollars, coupled with the unprecedented \$53 million in state matching funds, will be used to renovate Walla Walla High School, Pioneer Middle School, Lincoln High School, and fund other district-wide safety and infrastructure improvements. Bond tax rates will remain the same since the district's previous bond debt will be paid in full in December.

"This \$118M investment will impact the lives of thousands of students and hundreds of staff for decades to come," said Superintendent Wade Smith. "We listened to the community by prioritizing educational, safety and facility preservation needs in our bond planning and they responded with overwhelming support."

November 6, 2018 will be remembered as one of the more significant moments in our district's glorious 161-year history. On this historic day voters overwhelmingly supported a \$65.6M bond to renovate Walla Walla High School, Pioneer Middle School, Lincoln High School, and fund other district-wide safety and infrastructure improvements. Eligible for nearly \$53M in state match, this \$118M investment will impact the lives of thousands of students and hundreds of staff for decades to come.

I want to thank our dedicated Board of Directors who developed the inclusive and informed process. They empowered a community-led Facilities Task Force who spent exhaustive time and attention prioritizing facility preservation needs. In the end, our Board unanimously endorsed the conservative plan recommended that balanced building preservation needs, all while maintaining one of the region's lowest school bond rates.

Understanding our work has just begun, and the awesome responsibility and trust voters have provided, an 11-member independent Bond Oversight Committee has been formed. They will add an unprecedented layer of transparency and accountability. We will keep our promise; to deliver on the facility renovation and safety improvements, to invest state match funds only on the voter-approved projects, and to return any excess funds to buy down bond debt upon project completion.

When threats of violence are received the district immediately investigates in cooperation with local law enforcement officials. The district has and will continue to respond sincerely to any alleged threat and encourages everyone to report related matters immediately utilizing one of the district's many available resources.

"I welcome your input and ideas as we continue to refine our practices to ensure the safest environment possible for students and staff," said Superintendent Smith. "I am proud to serve as your Superintendent and be part of a community that cares so deeply for its children. Know that the safety of our kids underscores every decision we make. We appreciate the efforts of Jack and Allison as we work collectively to keep everyone safe."

SEATech Enrollment Continues to Grow

Advanced training attracts students to high tech programs



the new Criminal Justice program. Students receive training in conflict resolution, fingerprinting, investigative procedures, patrol procedures and criminal traffic laws.

SEATech (Southeast Area Technical Skills Center) is red hot as enrollment is at an all-time high, up 59 students since last year. Currently 211 students from Walla Walla High School and three regional high schools are taking advantage of the advanced-level Career and Technical Education programs. SEATech is geared to prepare students for post-secondary education and successful entry into high-skill, high-demand careers and employment.

SEATech offers Advanced Manufacturing and Welding, Audio and Video Production, Construction Technology, Health Sciences and this year added Criminal Justice.

The Washington State Legislature, following strong recommendations from District 16 legislators, approved \$11.5 million, or 90 percent of the funding, to design, construct and equip SEATech. Walla Walla Community College leases the land to Walla Walla Public Schools for \$1 per year. As a result of the state funding and WWCC partnership, this project did not impact local tax rates. The district broke ground on the project in March 2013 and SEATech opened for the start of the 2014-15 school year.

SEATech has formed a partnership with Boeing through the Manufacturing program to provide skilled workers for the Aerospace giant. Health Sciences students can earn their Nurse Assistant Certification and Audio and Video students learn industry standard software and editing techniques. Construction students work with power tools, read blue prints and learn applied math.

to begin the process of refining conceptual designs into formal construction documents. Districtwide safety and security projects, as well as identified roofing projects, will begin this summer. Superintendent Smith is also planning and preparing for the sale of bonds in December.

The three school renovation projects will have staggered construction starts to maximize opportunities for local contractor involvement. All projects are expected to be completed by 2022.

Historic Tree Park

Construction work began this fall to develop a new park on the west-side of the Walla Walla High School campus with the world's largest London Plane tree in existence, commonly referred to as a "Sycamore", as the focal point. Graduate of Distinction and 1969 Wa-Hi alum Michael Murr, in coordination with the Joseph L. Stubblefield Trust, has partnered with Walla Walla Public Schools to design and fund the park. The park will include tree protection measures, walking paths, decorative fencing and benches. The \$250,000 project began in early October and is expected to be completed by spring 2019.

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
