Kara Billingsley is the first to admit she is not an artist. But that doesn't keep this Colorado native from volunteering with the Carnegie Picture Lab to enhance art education for elementary school children in the Walla Walla Valley.

"I am not a particularly artistic person, but I love the mission of Picture Lab and the smiles it brings to kid's faces when I push my supply cart into their room before a project," said Billingsley. "As a bonus I feel like I learn as much as the kids, if not more, along the way!"

Picture Lab has been partnering with the Walla Walla School District for the past 10 years by delivering art lessons from more than 70 dedicated volunteers.

Kara is married to WWPS Graduate of Distinction recipient Tony Billingsley. They met at Whitworth College in Spokane. When it came time to raise a family they decided to return to Tony's hometown of Walla Walla to settle down. They now have four school-aged children. Kara has been volunteering with Picture Lab for about seven years.

Picture Lab lessons are designed on a six-year artist rotation, so students receive new experiences every year of their elementary school career. This vear's curriculum features Mexican artist Frida Kahlo, Dutch artist Piet Mondrian, and an interactive photography unit.

# **Promising Futures**

District establishes Promise Standards to support learning



The district has taken a major step forward in realizing its vision of "Developing Washington's Most Sought-After Graduates." Over the summer, 50 district teachers came together to identify the most critical skills students need in math and language arts at all grade levels.

These essential skills needed for successful schools, now known as Promise Standards, are readily available for families to see on district websites. Teachers will also use this newly created resource to communicate with students and their families.

"These are the most important standards students need to master on their path toward graduation" said Christy Krutulis, Executive Director of Teaching and Learning. "Math and language arts teachers collaborated to ensure as students move from grade level to grade level there isn't a repetition in their learning. Instead, there is a depth of learning built each year. Other content areas will follow."

#### LEVY = LEARNING BOND = BUILDING

Walla Walla Public Schools will seek renewal of its Replacement Education Levy in February. Levies are different than bonds. Levies pay for educational programs and opportunities for students the state does not fund. The Replacement Education Levy funds over 100 staff not paid for by the state's basic education funding model. Levies support school programs like music, art, honors courses, athletics, and a variety of experiences Walla Walla parents and stakeholders have approved at the ballot box for over 50 years. This is not a new tax, but a replacement levy that replaces the expiring 2016 levy.

Bonds are used for the construction of new schools, major building remodels or major facility upgrades. Voters approved a replacement bond in November 2018 to address facility improvements. Look for more information on the Replacement Education Levy election in the coming months.

## Dream Big! Jeannette C. Hayner Park



As WWPS Graduate of Distinction and 1969 alum Michael Murr was walking his dog one day last spring he glanced over at a tree he had passed by for years. This time the giant, 150' London Planetree, commonly referred to as a sycamore, caught his attention. Following some research it was discovered the tree on the campus of Walla Walla High School was the world's largest of its kind.

Murr reached out to Superintendent Dr. Wade Smith about funding the development of a park to showcase the tree. He envisioned a space to inspire students for years to come. His vision became reality with a ribbon cutting ceremony this fall, officially marking the opening of Jeannette C. Hayner Park. Hayner (1919-2010), a former influential school board member and Washington State Representative and Senator, led the much debated effort to relocate Wa-Hi to its current location. This beautiful park features walking paths, benches, decorative fencing and plantings. Murr encourages visitors to dream big about the future.



# History in the Making Science building breaks ground

For the first time in nearly six decades. Walla Walla High School students will have access to a new, modern science facility thanks to the generosity of the community. This exciting new era began this fall with a groundbreaking ceremony.

The science building is one component of the successful \$65.6M bond overwhelmingly approved by voters last November. This 18,000 sq ft facility includes eight identical, fully-functional laboratory classrooms and flexible teaching arrangements. More than \$2.5 million of work will be completed by local Walla Walla Valley contractors, suppliers, and vendors. The science building will be completed Summer 2020

I am even more proud of our academic accomplishments in light of the growing community-wide challenges facing incoming kindergarten students.

In Walla Walla, less than one in four students who entered kindergarten last year were deemed kindergarten ready, according to the state-wide WaKIDS assessment that measures social and academic preparedness among other attributes That number has continued to recede over recent years. This is an alarming statistic that not only impacts our school system, but the future success of our youth and greater community.

We maintain excellent private, non-profit and public early learning options for families However, years of study have identified access, affordability, limited providers and state licensing requirements continue to restrict early learning opportunities for many families This includes those not impacted by economic

With fewer than 25% of incoming kindergarten students prepared in Walla Walla, nearly half the state-wide average, tremendous resources and attention continue to be focused to remediate lacking skillsets. However, one need just imagine the possibility if we could reverse our readiness trend and begin to improve our early learning preparedness. Think how much farther we could take all students if even half came prepared for kindergarten. Instead of remediating skill sets we could be enriching them!

We are at an opportune time as early learning momentum has peaked across our valley As the Walla Walla School Board transitions Blue Ridge Elementary into a wall-to-wall community early learning center to expand access the City of Walla Walla partners with the National League of Cities to explore enhanced early learning initiatives, and our valley's powerful early learning leaders continue to champion efforts. I am confident we can come together to address school readiness for all youth.
