
Mike and Sue Gillespie established the "Golden Onion Award" in 2010 to provide school supplies, equipment and professional development funds to Walla Walla educators.



Maintenance priority

As a part of the district's ongoing maintenance plan, two significant projects were recently completed. A new \$269,000 roof was put on at Pioneer Middle School and new \$162,000 energy efficient boilers were installed at Berney Elementary. D&D Roofing & Construction was the low bidder on Pioneer Middle School roof project. The project included replacing underlayment, membrane and asphalt shingles.

Walla Walla's Cutting Edge Plumbing completed the Berney boiler project. The original Berney steam boiler was only 60 percent efficient while the two new boilers boast 92 percent efficiency ratings. The existing boiler was no longer repairable.

Drug Free Youth

Local Coalition promotes wellness

Peggy Needham, Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative Coordinator, briefed the school board on W2 for Drug Free Youth. This is a local community coalition that is part of the Washington State Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative. W2 for Drug Free Youth is operating on \$90,000 annually for the next four years.



Peggy Needham and Luis Rosales are placing banners at each school to raise awareness. Luis is the Executive Director, Trilogy Recovery Community. The coalition works to prevent use of alcohol and other drugs by our youth. They organize community forums, utilize the media, display informational signs and banners and support various agencies.

W2 for Drug Free Youth is participating in the "Talk. They Hear You." Underage Drinking Prevention campaign. Look for a community survey from W2 for Drug Free Youth coming out soon.
