

### Replacement Levy

## School board votes to put levy on ballot February 9, 2016



This is not a new tax, but a continuation of local operating funds for the district. The state only funds approximately 70 percent of the district's General Fund budget for Walla Walla Public Schools. This proposed Replacement Levy impacts nearly all aspects





of district programs and services by funding 20 percent of the district's General Fund. Federal dollars make up the remaining 10 percent of the district's budget. The voterapproved 2012 Educational Programs and Operations Replacement Levy expires in December 2016 and this Levy would replace it. Levy dollars impact nearly all aspects of district programs and services, including funding more than 30 teachers. Board members voted to increase the levy dollar amount by two percent each of the four-years to help offset rising operational costs. Proposed cost per \$1000 rates for taxpayers are similar to current rates.

#### Golden honored for service

School board member Anne Golden participated in her final school board meeting last night after 28 years of service. Community members and staff thanked Golden during a public reception. School board members also unanimously approved a resolution to permanently name the boardroom the "Anne Golden Boardroom."

#### Sleep Study survey to launch Friday

Walla Walla Public Schools is conducting a survey as part of a Sleep Study on the benefits and implications of changing Walla Walla High School's starting time. The survey will go live Friday and remain open for two weeks.

Under the proposal being studied, first period would begin at 8:30 a.m. at Walla Walla High School. This would push the start of 7th period to 3 p.m. with school ending at 4 p.m. First period currently begins at 7:30 a.m. and 7th period is over at 3 p.m. The proposed change would take effect at the start of the 2016-2017 school year. Approximately 50 percent of Walla Walla High School students currently take a first period class beginning at 7:30 a.m. The other 50 percent of Wa-Hi students start school at 8:30 a.m. during second period. Approximately 25 percent of Wa-Hi students have a seven period schedule.
